This template can be used for multiple purposes:

- It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium
- It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium
- It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make **additional and sustainable improvements** to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated [Primary PE and sport premium guidance](#).

The Primary PE and sport premium guidance, outlines 5 key priorities that funding should be used towards. It is not



necessary that spending has to meet all the key priorities, you should select the priorities that you aim to use any funding towards.

Although completing this template is not a requirement for schools, schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding. Schools must also outline what the impact this funding has had on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment and how any spending will be sustainable in the future. **All funding must be spent by 31st July 2024.**

The Department for Education has worked closely with the Association for Physical Education (afPE) and the Youth Sport Trust (YST) to develop this template and encourages schools to use it. This template is an effective way of meeting the reporting requirements of the Primary PE and sport premium.

Provide teachers with clear long term planning, expert medium term and short term planning and with the progression of skills through the use of the 'Complete PE' scheme of work to raise confidence in the teaching of sequences of PE and to ensure high outcomes. Provide PE specialist staff within school who are available for support, guidance and team teaching for PE.	Children's participation and enjoyment during their PE lessons is something that we have seen increase across the school. This has been a result of the increase in teacher confidence.	Teaching across the school in PE has improved a lot. The children coming through the school have a good use of technical vocabulary and understanding of how different skills are used across different sports. By the time they reach UKS2 they are able to move onto the more challenging concepts of tactical understanding as they have a grasp of the basic skills.
We have been able to attend more competitive fixtures and ensured that we have taken the majority of children who have wanted to attend sports events.	Engagement and love of activity and sport has increased as children know that they will get their chance to attend different sports festivals. This has been seen across the school as children know they get a fair opportunity for these events.	Standards of sport across the school are improving through inviting a range of children to competitions. By getting experience of being in a competitive environment, children are rising to the occasion and we have seen a lot of success through the year with a range of age groups.

Swimming Data

<u>Question</u>	<u>Stats:</u>	<u>Further context</u> <u>Relative to local challenges</u>
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 meters?	58%	Children access swimming lessons through school but this is usually the only opportunity they have to access the swimming pool due to low income and they cannot afford extra lessons outside of school.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	58%	As above, children do not often get the opportunity to practice their swimming outside of swimming lessons. For around 30% of our children it is their first experience in a swimming pool so they are still making great progress within their lessons but not able to reach the national expectation of performing the different swimming strokes.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	TBC%	Children are unable to put their learning into practice due to costs of using local swimming pools.
If your schools swimming data is below national expectation, you can choose to use the Primary PE and sport premium to provide additional top-up sessions for those pupils that did not meet National Curriculum requirements after the completion of core lessons. Have you done this?	No	Unfortunately, due to staffing numbers this is not something we would be able to facilitate for a group of children. The demands on the timetable also mean that it would leave children missing out on key lessons to attend extra swimming sessions.
Have you provided CPD to improve the knowledge and confidence of staff to be able to teach swimming and water safety?	Yes	We have had water safety sessions by Active Education across the school as this was noticed to be an improvement point as a school. We have seen our percentage increase due to this. This will hopefully increase the confidence of children and give them more confidence upon entering the water.
